Program Design Considerations

- Multiple grants and implementing similar programs concurrently
- Similar (or same) impacted areas
- Disasters close together in time





Program Design - Solutions

- Keep it simple (don't design programs that exceeds your capacity)
- Consider a stream lined damage assessment
- Software is KEY-KEY-KEY (plan and design ahead)
- Always remember compliance and close-out in your initial design
- Consider Critical Design, Decisions, Documents upfront
- Remember every disaster is different, tailor your program design in ways that work for your specific recovery needs (ONE SIZE DOES NOT FIT ALL)









Regulations and Alternative Requirements



Regs and Requirements Challenges

- Avoiding duplication of benefits across multiple disasters
- Waivers not applicable across CDBG-DR appropriations
- Ensuring national objective requirements are met
- Applicants non-compliance of previous grant requirements (NCOMP;
 Flood Insurance)
- Availability of data getting it and keeping it current





Regs & Requirements -- Solutions

- Software solutions
 - Cost estimating
 - Applicant tracking for previous program compliance
 - Subrecipient tracking across grants
 - Design considerations that accommodate multiple activity types
 - Choose software program(s) that can be easily updated as needed
- Coordinated efforts with other grantees on critical issues
- Discuss ideas and issues with your HUD grant manager as early as possible (e.g. potential need for waivers, request TA, etc.)









Capacity Challenges



Capacity Challenges

- Capacity of grantee and subrecipients to carry out multiple programs
- Finding and retaining staff with program knowledge and experience
- Subrecipient staffing
- Supply of qualified contractors
- Demands of training, TA and subrecipient monitoring



Capacity Challenges - Solutions

- Use of General Revenue funding
- Staff deployment
 - Training curriculum for grantee new hires and existing staff
 - Oversight and training of subrecipients
 - Monitoring and compliance
- Grants management
 - Use of outside vendor(s)
 - State-developed software
- Early implementation decisions (direct vs. subrecipent)
- Relationships with HUD staff







Tracking Timelines and Expenditures



Tracking Timelines & Expenditures: Challenges

- Keeping both tranches of same allocation and grants from different allocations separate
- Financial tracking to ensure timely expenditure of funds
- Funds request processing
- Maintaining separate projections financial and metric
- DRGR reporting
- Large grants with 6-year expenditure deadlines
- Ensuring subrecipients stay on track with grantee deadlines





Tracking Timelines & Expenditures -- Solutions

- Software programs to support grant programmatic and financial management
- Budgetary monitoring
- Vendor requirements
- Standardization of forms and procedures
- Always have a Plan B









Balancing Competing Priorities



Balancing Competing Priorities: Challenges

- Maximizing resources to serve the most people while adhering to MID requirements
- Decisions regarding allocation of funds
- Decisions regarding selection of subrecipients
- Decisions regarding selection of contractors



Balancing Competing Priorities -- Solutions

- Contractor management
- Capacity assessments
- Subrecipient management
- Maximizing efficiencies through allocation strategies
