What is the Benefit?

The Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) is a Federal Communications Commission (FCC) Program that provides a discount on monthly broadband bills for qualifying low-income households.

Eligible households can receive:

- Up to \$30/month discount for broadband service and associated equipment rentals;
- Up to \$75/month discount for households on Tribal lands, and;
- A one-time discount for \$100 for a laptop, desktop, or tablet purchased through a participating provider.



Household Eligibility

A Household is eligible if the household income is at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines, or if a member of the household meets at least *one* of the criteria below:

- Participates in certain assistance programs, such as SNAP, Medicaid, Federal Public Housing Assistance, SSI, WIC, or Lifeline;
- Veterans Pension and Survivors Benefit
- Participates in Tribal specific programs, such as Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance, Tribal TANF, or Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations;
- Participates in the National School Lunch Program or the School Breakfast Program;
- Received a Pell Grant in the current award year; or
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating provider's existing low-income program.



Lifeline and the Affordable Connectivity Program

What is Lifeline?

Lifeline is the FCC's program to help make communications services more affordable for lowincome consumers. To participate in the Lifeline program, consumers must either have an income that is at or below 135% of the <u>federal poverty guidelines</u> or participate in certain federal assistance programs, such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Medicaid, Federal Public Housing Assistance, Supplemental Security Income, the Veterans and Survivors Pension Benefit, or certain Tribal Programs. Find out if you are eligible by reviewing the information available at <u>lifelinesupport.org</u> (click "Do I Qualify?").

Under ACP:

You must opt-in with your existing provider or request enrollment in the ACP with a participating internet provider and chose an eligible service plan. You can choose to receive the benefit from your current Lifeline service provider or another participating provider.

You can combine these benefits with other state and local benefits where available. They can be applied to the same qualifying service or separately to a Lifeline service and an ACP service with the same or different providers. For example, an eligible household could have a Lifelinesupported mobile phone service and a separate home internet service that is supported through the Affordable Connectivity Program.

Two Steps to Enroll

Step 1

 Go to <u>ACPBenefit.org</u> to apply, or print out a mail-in application. Once you receive a confirmation of your eligibility

Step 2

 Contact your preferred participating provider to select a plan and have the discount applied to your bill.
