



COVID-19 Cases Over Time


Daily Trends in Number of COVID-19 Cases in The United States Reported to CDC





CDC COVID Data Tracker


COVID-19 Community Levels Map



COVID RESPONSE TEAM

- The Department of Health Service's (DHS)- Housing for Health (HFH) COVID Response Team (CRT) operates mobile COVID mitigation programs in shelters, street-based settings, and permanent supportive housing throughout LA County including risk assessments, technical assistance, COVID Testing, and COVID Vaccinations.
- A total of **40,214** vaccinations have been administered to **20,970** distinct individuals. A total of **14,281** distinct PEH have had at least 1 shot in their arm, and **10,501** PEH have been fully vaccinated.

HISTORY OF MEDICAL MISTRUST

- The PEH community continues to confront a long history of discrimination and negative interactions with medical services
- PEH Racial and Ethnic Minorites have been disproportionately affected which is a contributing factor to medical mistrust.
- With this in mind, we wanted to enlist the assistance of ambassadors of the community to act as bridges for our teams to the community we are providing services to



PEER AMBASSADOR PROGRAM

- The CRT Vaccine Peer Program has operated since September 2021.
- The CRT Vaccine Peer Ambassadors are currently PEH or formerly PEH that are interested in promoting the vaccine in and around their immediate communities.
- Generally, they are activated on a same day basis and engage in community outreach with our internally hired Community Health Workers to promote the vaccine amongst PEH.
- Peer Ambassadors are compensated through a \$25 dollar gift card for every hour volunteered

WHO CAN BECOME A PEER AMBASSADOR?

Must be Vaccinated



*PAs can volunteer a maximum of 8 hours a day

*PAs can volunteer a maximum of 23 hours in total for the calendar year

PEER AMBASSADORS:



- Assist with outreach and passing out flyers
- Share their vaccine stories
- Assist with passing out hygiene kits, harm reduction kits, and snacks



OUTREACH FLYERS

WHAT HAVE WE LEARNED?

- To build confidence, communities should hire vaccine ambassadors with lived experience to engage PEH and homeless service providers. Allow them to lead as they know their communities the best.
- We have worked with more than 250 individual peers at over 280 locations, 30% of the vaccines given out at these locations can be partially attributed to peer engagement.
- On average, we see that we vaccinate 1 more person, per hour at vaccine events with Peer Ambassadors present as opposed to vaccine clinics without Peer Ambassadors.
- Peer Ambassadors are important pieces to the community-based work we do!




EMERGENCY HOUSING VOUCHERS

The Emergency Housing Voucher (EHV) program is available through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). Through EHV, HUD is providing 70,000 housing choice vouchers to local Public Housing Authorities (PHAs) in order to assist individuals and families who are homeless, at-risk of homelessness, fleeing, or attempting to flee, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or human trafficking, or were recently homeless or have a high risk of housing instability.

EHV Dashboard


Review the EHV Dashboard for daily updates on leasing, issuances, and unit utilization, and information on voucher awards and funding by PHA. Users can navigate the dashboard pages by selecting the forward and back arrows or the EHV dashboard can be accessed via the EHV Dashboard page. Training will be provided on the EHV Dashboard during Office Hours on November 16th.






Use of Service Fees

With 18,500 EHVs leased (26%), and 50,000 issued thru 4/25/22:

4.7% of \$244.3 million reported spent through March 2022

Success Rate (Lease to Issuance Rate)

Measured with each weekly issuance cohort and cumulatively

The "success rate" depends on the number of days after which you expect little to no leasing.

If the cutoff is 210 days, 63% of the 9,914 issued vouchers were leased.


If that is 180 days, 57% of the 16,061 issued vouchers have been leased.


Alternative Approaches to I&Q Spaces

CONSIDERATIONS			
Good Approach	Better Approach	Best Approach	

- > Communities may need to use a variety of isolation and quarantine strategies to meet the needs of people experiencing homelessness.
- The framework below provides a graduated approach to isolation and quarantine, ranging from isolating or quarantining residents within the shelter facility to exploring non-congregate sheltering options.
- > Coordinated approaches with public health partners are necessary to navigate evolving threats.

Shelter-Based Isolation in Place

- What is isolation in place? The practice of sheltering COVID-19-positive or symptomatic individuals using private rooms (such as offices) or sectioning off areas within existing congregate settings.
- Provides a workflow to identify the need for shelter based isolation.
- Defines attributes of Isolation in Place
- Community Examples:
 - Los Angeles, CA & Seattle, WA





Vaccine Incentives Commonly Asked Questions

Q: Can ESG-CV provide incentives to program participants that had their vaccinations prior to entering and ESG-funded program?

A: No. Program participants who are already fully vaccinated would not be eligible to receive incentive payments

Q: Do I have to enter everyone who gets a vaccine incentive into HMIS?

A: No. The vaccine incentives are treated for reporting purposes as a unique activity and will not need a CSV CAPER.





Vaccine Incentives Commonly Asked Questions

Q: Can I purchase any type of gift card to be used as a vaccine incentive?

A: No, if your organization is using gift cards as a vaccine incentive, the gift cards must be unrestricted.

Q: Can I offer cash as a vaccine incentive instead of a gift card?

A: Yes. Notice CPD-21-08 authorizes direct, cash payments of up to \$50 per dose to people experiencing homelessness as an incentive for receiving a coronavirus vaccine, which would include a coronavirus booster if recommended by the CDC.

Expenditure Deadlines - Updated

Milestone Expenditure Deadline Update:

OLD deadline: 80% by March 31, 2022

NEW deadline: 50% by June 16, 2022

What happens if grantees miss the June 16 deadline?

HUD may recapture funds:

Up to 50% of total allocation (adjusted by any previously recaptured amounts)





Expenditure Deadlines - Updated

Overall Expenditure Deadline Update:

OLD deadline: 100% by September 30, 2022

NEW deadlines:

- 9/30/23: 100% of RRH, Emerg. Shelter, HP, Street Outreach
- 12/31/23: 100% of Admin, HMIS (extra time for closeout)
- 6/30/2024 for reallocated funds





Reallocations

Establishes Process for Recapture and Reallocation Funds

- HUD will post reallocation amounts, and provide recipients with 7-days to accept funds.
- HUD will obligate funds via grant agreement amendment. Recipients of reallocated funds must amend their consolidated plan, post on a government website, and update IDIS.
- Recipients from which HUD recaptures funds must amend their consolidated plan and update IDIS prior to drawing down funds.





Available Waivers - Updated

Waiver of Limits on Housing Stability Case Management

• The Notice waives the 24-month limit on housing stability case management.

Waiver of Obligation Deadline Requirement for State ESG Recipients

• State recipients of reallocated funds must obligate funds within 180 days from the date HUD signs the grant agreement amendment for reallocated funds.

Waiver of ESG Program Requirements for Reallocation

• This waiver allows HUD to use an alternative reallocation formula and to expedite reallocations.





Expiration of Flexibilities

Expiration of ESG-CV Flexibilities for Annual ESG Grants

• All ESG-CV flexibilities applied to annual ESG used to prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus expire on September 30, 2022.
