






Testing Event Results, By Shelter Type

5 Tips to Approaching Rehousing with Racial Equity

- 1. Understand Factors that Contribute to Racial Disparities
 - Look at your data (qualitative and quantitative) to identify the differences in outcomes for people of different racial and ethnic groups
- 2. Co-Design your Rehousing Strategy with Black people, Indigenous people, and other people of color, and People with Lived Expertise
 - Analyze your data in partnership with the people most impacted by inequities and design a strategy that better meets the needs in your community and advances equity
- 3. Continuously Evaluate Data Expand What Creates Equitable Outcomes and Change What Does Not
 - Set goals around addressing disparities
 - Regularly evaluate progress, and make changes as needed



5 Tips to Approaching Rehousing with Racial Equity

- 4. Build and Budget Programs that Account for Structural Employment Barriers
 - Deepen partnerships with employment agencies, provide extra supports for jobseekers, and be prepared to provide deeper and longer-term rental assistance to give tenants more time to secure employment
- 5. Expand your Landlord Reach and Diversify Housing Options
 - Work with landlords and Public Housing Agencies to reduce barriers to housing (e.g. credit requirements, background checks)
 - Consider the positives and negatives of different local neighborhood options safety, support systems, culturally appropriate businesses, communities of faith – and work to build landlord relationships and housing options in a variety of areas

Partnering with Local Public Housing Agencies (PHAs)

Topic: Fostering positive, systems-level relationships between CoCs and PHAs with the goal of ending and preventing homelessness. Key steps:

- Strategic Planning
- Have Clear Goals
- Establish Points of Contact
- Share Data
- Leverage Staff



Synthesizing the Plans



The way home continuum of care (CoC) has been developing a **five-year strategic plan** to prevent and end homelessness in Houston and Harris, Fort Bend, and Montgomery counties.



The proposed **CARES community-wide housing plan** outlines a way to use new federal funding coming to our region to **slow the spread of the coronavirus** by implementing the housing interventions that were already part of the fiveyear plan on an expedited timeline.

- On July 1, Houston, Harris County, Coalition announced \$65M plan to house 5,000 people over the next two years
- Housing is healthcare














Private Funding Tracker




Program Implementation & Support Structure



Community-wide COVID Housing Program


Startup Timeline






