

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

Coronavirus Aid Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act Funding of 2020

- The Health Resources and Services Administration HIV/AIDS Bureau awarded \$90 million for Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program recipients across the country to prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).
- This funding is provided by the fiscal year (FY) 2020 Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, and was distributed across Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program Parts A – F.
- The funding cycle began on April 1, 2020 and ended on March 31, 2021.
- HRSA HAB announced in February 2021 that FY 2020 CARES Act funded RWHAP recipients are eligible to request a no-cost extension.





Services Covered Under FY 2020 CARES Act

- All services under Policy Clarification Notice (PCN) 16-02 were identified as an allowable expense.
- Most popular services included the following:
 - Rental assistance
 - Emergency Financial Assistance (EFA)
 - Telehealth support
 - Medication

CARES Act Award Information

- CARES Act provides \$65M in supplemental funding for HOPWA
 - > \$53.7M for formula grantees using the same data elements to determine their FY2020 HOPWA formula allocations
 - > \$10M in one-time, non-renewable funding for competitive grantees that is proportionate to their existing grants
 - > \$1.3M to TA providers as an increase to prior award

• This is a "one-time" award and must be directly related to the COVID-19 crisis.







General Use of Funds

- CARES Act funds are to be used to "maintain operations and for rental assistance, supportive services, and other necessary actions in order to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19."
- Funds may be used to provide eligible HOPWA activities in a manner that addresses the needs of each grantee community related to COVID-19 preparedness and response.
- CARES Act funds may be used to cover or reimburse allowable costs incurred by a grantee or project sponsor for allowable activities
 regardless of the date on which such costs were incurred.







Types of Eligible Activities

- Short-Term Rent, Mortgage, and Utility (STRMU) assistance to prevent homelessness;
- Stays at hotels or motels to quarantine HOPWA-eligible individuals or their family members;
- Transportation services for access to medical care, supplies, and food or to commute to places of employment;
- Assisting HOPWA eligible households in accessing essential services and supplies;
- Nutrition services in the form of food banks, groceries, and meal deliveries;
- Education on preventing the spread of COVID-19; and
- Infection control measures such as cleaning supplies, PPE, and gloves for staff and assisted households.



CARES Act Flexibilities

- Increased caps on administrative expenses for both grantees (6%) and project sponsors (10%);
- Short-Term Rent, Mortgage, and Utility (STRMU)
 assistance payments to prevent homelessness can be
 provided for up to 24 months; and
- Relocation services including lodging at hotels, motels, or other locations can be provided for eligible persons living with HIV as well as household members who are not living with HIV/AIDS.







Duplication of Benefits

- Section 312 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5155), prohibits the duplication of benefits (DOB) for programs that provide financial assistance to people or entities suffering losses as a result of a Federally-declared disaster or emergency.
- DOB occurs when Federal assistance is provided to a person or entity that has received (or would receive, by acting reasonably to obtain available assistance) assistance for the same costs from another source (including insurance), and the total amount received exceeds the total need for those costs.
- HOPWA grantees and project sponsors are required to establish and maintain policies and procedures to prevent DOB with CARES Act funds.





Waivers

- HUD issued memorandums providing regulatory waivers of certain CoC, ESG, HOPWA, and Consolidated Plan requirements to help:
 - Prevent the spread of COVID-19
 - ➤ Provide additional supports to individuals and families eligible for CoC, ESG, and HOPWA assistance who are economically impacted by COVID-19
- HOPWA-specific waivers:
 - > Self-Certification of Income and Credible Information on HIV Status
 - FMR Rent Standard
 - Property Standards
 - Space and Security
 - > Time Limits for Short-Term Supported Housing (STRMU & Short-Term Facilities)
 - > APR/CAPER Submission Requirements



- Attends Housing Solutions meetings

At-Large Participation

KCHD Housing Staff:

- Participate in committees and work groups – provide HIV system perspective, help form policies
- Stay informed on bigger picture issues around homeless services, advocacy, funding, etc.



How Does All of That Relate to CARES Act Coordination?

We can coordinate services well because of the journey we've been on to build up our programs and relationships over the last several years.

Key helpers:

- Communication and coordination
 - Medical Case Management and Housing Agencies
 - Ryan White Recipient and HOPWA Grantee
 - HIV System and Local HUD Continuum of Care System(s)
- Think outside the box
 - Explore demonstration projects and other atypical funding
 - Get involved in local CoC even if you aren't a Recipient or Subrecipient



CoC and COVID-19 Response

Greater KC Coalition to End Homelessness

- Serves as a central hub for gathering information on what services are/were available
- Coordination of services across much of KC-TGA
- Advocacy efforts helped with hotels, quarantining locations, warming centers, etc.

CARES Act Funded Activities - Rationale

Keep funding in service categories already provided and with subrecipients already providing services

- Quick turnaround from when funding was announced before contracts had to be in place and activities were supposed to start
- Easiest to make amendments to current contracts
- Mindful of what services were most likely going to be needed in the "new normal"
- Not so much about new services, but implementing policies and procedures to make current services accessible virtually, implementing waivers, etc.

CARES Act Funded Activities - Changes

Moved funding from services that weren't being utilized – LOTS of funding came in from different sources

- RW: Some providers reported feeling overwhelmed with trying to figure out how to apply funding appropriately and were able to serve clients/patients without using RW CARES Act funds
- HOPWA: Local CoC and City coordinated larger system hotel and quarantine programs that PWH could access as needed
- Recognized a big gap: Clients needed increased capability to access services virtually



Technology & Communications Support (TACS) Program

- Smart phones and tablets for RW-eligible clients
- Acquisition, payment, and distribution managed through one MCM agency
 - Referrals can come from MCM and/or Housing Providers
- Devices have 1 year plan with unlimited data; clients get to keep device and phone number
- Devices come pre-loaded with apps to help connect with HIV care and support services – Doxy.me, Zoom, etc.
- Research component to assess how the program is helping clients, issues to be addressed, etc.



Sustainability

- TACS Program Big interest to continue to support post-CARES Act funding by Missouri Part B, potentially other sources
 - Data from research component will help justify continued funding
- COVID and Housing Policies Work Group working on COVIDrelated policies for now, but will continue beyond that scope to ensure housing policies are informed by Housing, MCM, and Recipient
- Continuing to grow both RW and Housing Programs through various means – CoC involvement, CQII Learning Collaborative, EHE, future demonstration projects

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Louisiana HIV Surveillance Data

- ►In 2018, CDC ranked:
 - **4th** in the nation for HIV case rates (20.9 per 100,000 population).
 - The Baton Rouge MSA ranked **3rd** in HIV case rates (27.3 per 100,000) and the New Orleans MSA ranked **7th** (24.2 per 100,000) among the large metropolitan areas in the nation.
 - **4th** in the nation for AIDS case rates (9.1 per 100,000).
 - The Baton Rouge MSA ranked **10th** in AIDS case rates (9.4 per 100,000) and the New Orleans MSA ranked **5th** in AIDS case rates (12.9 per 100,000) among large metropolitan areas in the nation.
- ► As of December 31, 2020, a total of 22,285 people were living with HIV in Louisiana, 11,070 (50%) of whom have an AIDS diagnosis.
- ▶25% of PLWH live in the Baton Rouge MSA, 39% in New Orleans MSA, and 36% in the rest of the state.



STD/HIV/Hepatitis Program (SHHP)

SHHP strives to support a comprehensive, coordinated, continuum of person-centered core medical and support services so People Living with HIV (PLWH) may enjoy overall wellness and positive health outcomes.


Louisiana Health Access Program (LA HAP)

- ► Health Insurance Assistance Program covers insurance plan premiums as well as non-drug copays, coinsurance, and deductibles for insured individuals.
- ► Louisiana Drug Assistance Program covers drug costs for uninsured individuals as well as drug copays, coinsurance, and deductibles for insured individuals.

Housing Opportunities for People with AIDS (HOPWA)

Program

- --To purchase medications and provide insurance assistance;
- --To contract with 7 Community-Based Organizations (CBOs) across the state to provide case management and support services;
- --To contract with <u>the same</u> 7 CBOs across the state to support housing needs.



COVID-19 Response & CARES Act Dollars

Three Aims

- ▶Get the dollars out fast
- Prioritize services based on emerging needs
- ▶ Properly track the funds

SHHP Response

- ► Virtual meetings with 7 sub-recipients
- Identification of emerging client needs across Ryan White and HOPWA service categories
- Services already built into subrecipients' combined RW/HOPWA contracts
- ► Issued guidance related to invoicing and tracking

- ► Housing
- ► Medical Transportation

Relationship & Good Faith

- ▶Sub-recipient contract amendments were initiated the first week of May 2020
- ► Amendments were approved in August 2020
- Services delivered before amendments approved



Data Integration

- ▶Ryan White and HOPWA services already tracked in CAREWare
- ► CARES Act services added to CAREWare
- Invoicing guidance provided along with CAREWare report cheat sheet



Successes & Challenges

SUCCESSES

- ► Combined RW and HOPWA contracts enabling quick pivot
- ►No work plan required
- ► Longstanding relationships with contractors
- ► CAREWare already tracked RW & HOPWA
- ► Approval of no-cost extension for RW
- ► Multiple years to expend funds for HOPWA
- **▶**Resilience

CHALLENGES

- ▶ Pandemic strain on bandwidth
- Quick changes required to fully operationalize
- **►**Hurricanes
