

Federal Recovery and CDBG-DR Program

Federal Funding for Disaster Recovery

- For declared disasters, different forms of federal assistance may be available to individuals and households
- Start here: https://www.disasterassistance.gov/
- Most common types of assistance
 - Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)
 - Individual Assistance
 - Hazard Mitigation Grant Program
 - Small Business Administration (SBA) Disaster Loans
 - HUD CDBG-DR







CDBG-DR Program Overview

- Provided as a special appropriation by Congress to states, cities, and counties to assist with long term <u>recovery</u> following a Presidentially-declared disaster
- Flexible program that allows grantees to deploy funding to carry out a wide range of recovery activities related to housing, infrastructure and economic development
- Majority of funding must benefit low- and moderate-income (LMI) persons and areas
- Recent allocations place heavy emphasis on housing recovery
- Requirements based upon the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program
 - Formula block grant provided to cities, counties, and states
 - Flexible program with a large number of eligible activities


Approves appropriation

- 1. Calculates and announces allocations
- Publishes a notice in the Federal Register (FR)
- 3. Awards funds

- 1. Prepares Action Plan
- 2. Executes grant agreement with HUD
- 3. Administers and implements program

Designing the Program & Action Plan Development

- Action Plan is prepared by the state or local government receiving CDBG-DR funding
- Components of Action Plan
 - Impact and Unmet Needs Assessment of housing, infrastructure and economic revitalization needs
 - Method of Distribution explaining what housing, infrastructure, and economic revitalization programs grantee will fund



CDBG-DR Implementation Models

Three basic models:

Direct

Grantee implements

Partner

Grantee partners with other agencies, nonprofits, or contractors

Distribution

Grantee gives to Units of General Local
Government

- Models can and often are combined
- Decisions based on tradition, capacity and complexity of programs
- Detailed program policies and procedures needed for all models

Typical Housing Activities

- New construction and rehabilitation/reconstruction programs
 - Single family homeowner and rental
 - Multifamily rental
 - Public housing
 - Special needs/permanent supportive housing
- Elevation programs
- Buyout programs
- Homeownership assistance programs (down payment, soft second mortgage assistance)

Typical Social Services Activities

- Wide range of public services are permitted, such as:
 - Housing counseling
 - Tenant based rental assistance
 - Mortgage assistance for a limited time
 - Homelessness prevention services
- Total funding available for public services is limited to 15% of the CDBG-DR grant, unless a waiver is provided by HUD

- \$62.1 billion in active grants
- 108 grants to 60 grantees (33 states and 27 local governments)

Housing Counseling Agencies and CDBG-DR

Housing Counseling Requirements Specific to 2017 CDBG-DR Grantees

- "Grantees <u>required</u> to coordinate with HUD-certified housing counseling organizations to ensure that information and services are made available to both renters and homeowners."
 - Note: Public law uses the term "certified" in place of approved
- Prior to 2017 CDBG-DR grantees were encouraged, but not required, to coordinate

Potential CDBG-DR Housing Counseling Activities

- Housing counseling services can be offered as a stand alone program
- Use of HUD-approved housing counseling agencies can be incorporated to support the implementation of the following programs:
 - Single family rehabilitation
 - Tenant based rental assistance
 - Buyouts
 - Other types of housing assistance

Potential CDBG-DR Eligible Housing Counseling Services

- Assist with accessing and applying for CDBG-DR housing program assistance
- Community outreach
- Housing counseling services
 - Financial and credit counseling
 - Foreclosure and Loss Mitigation counseling
 - Finding temporary alternative housing
 - Rental counseling
 - Reconstruction and home repair counseling
 - Homeless counseling

- Share information about the need your agency is seeing in the impacted community and what services you can offer to assist with meeting the need
- Review and comment on the published Action Plan
- Track CDBG-DR program progress and look for opportunities as recovery progresses

Program Component	Description	
Program goal	Ensuring all households impacted by Superstorm Sandy have access to and understand services available to them for recovery	
Program services	 Assist applicants to apply for homeowner rebuilding funding & rental assistance including Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) General housing counseling services (e.g. credit repair, foreclosure & homelessness prevention, mortgage readiness, rental guidance, referrals, relocation assistance, fair housing rights, mobility & financial literacy) 	
Selection process	Competitive procurement process with five nonprofit organizations selected	
Partners	 Homeowner & rental recovery programs Community based nonprofit organizations conducting outreach to let households and individuals know about the program 	
Outputs	5,909 households assisted as of Q4 2017 and \$4.6 million expended
