





Tracie Oaks-Ross Office of Policy and Grant Administration Office of Housing Counseling

Purpose: The initiative is designed to expand Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) and other Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs) roles and effectiveness in addressing the housing and financial needs of their local communities, expand partnerships with housing counseling agencies, and provide housing counseling services. HUD seeks to leverage the expert experience and community engagement of HBCUs and other MSIs within minority communities to help remove any barriers to housing services and increase financial education for this targeted population.

- \$3 million awarded for the Minority-Serving Institution initiative
- 16 HUD-approved housing counseling agencies partnering with HBCUs, HSIs, or other MSIs

Minority Serving Institution (MSI): An institution serving a high proportion of minority students. 'Minority students' refers to students who are Black, Hispanic, Asian/Pacific Islander, or American Indian/Alaska Native

Seven Types of MSIs:

- Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU)
- Predominantly Black Institutions (PBI)
- Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HSI)
- Tribal Colleges or Universities
- Native American Non-Tribal Institutions (NANTI)
- Alaskan Native or Native Hawaiian-Serving Institutions (ANNHI)
- Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander-Serving Institutions (AANAPISI)

- Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)
 - The MOU is required at Grant Execution
 - You must submit an MOU for each funded HBCU/MSI partner
 - At a minimum, the MOU must contain:
 - Partnership purpose and associated activities
 - Management and organizational structure
 - Each organization's role and responsibilities for funding, participation, and compliance
 - How the grantee will integrate data sharing and reporting capabilities
 - You are expected to initiate the activities promptly
 - HUD may withhold or recapture theses funds if you fail to provide a copy of the signed MOU(s) by March 31, 2022

Projected Budget:

- You must describe how the HBCU/MSI funds will be used to further the objectives agreed upon in the MOU in their projected budget. Follow projected budget requirements in Article IV(B)
- 18-Month Period of Performance: 04/01/2021 09/30/2022

• Eligible Activities:

- The eligible activities are outlined in Section IV.F, Funding Restrictions of the NOFO.
 - 1. Housing counseling and group education
 - 2. Oversight, compliance, and quality control
 - 3. Supervision of housing counseling staff
 - 4. Housing counselor training and certification
 - 5. Marketing and outreach of the Housing Counseling Program

Budget Line Items for FY2021 Awards:

- Counseling Services (9500)
- MSI Initiative (9525)

Grant Activity Reporting Requirements:

- You must indicate the amount of funds expended and the relevant category of eligible activities carried out pursuant to this funding initiative; and
- You must include a brief narrative describing progress and challenges in achieving performance goals and objectives described in the NOFO application

A Note on Reporting Counseling and Education Activities:

• If your scope of work includes providing one-on-one counseling by a certified counselor and/or group workshops to the MSI partner's community, you can report that on the 9902

• Final Report Requirements:

- You must include everything required for Grant Activity Reports; and
- Describe the extent to which you (or your partner(s)) were able to fulfill the program
 objectives described in your NOFO application, including outcomes and lessons learned
- At a minimum, you must address the five topics below:
 - How you measured outcomes on the target population (examples listed in the Grant Agreement);
 - How the institution's students and faculty were included in the proposed activities;
 - How the institution expanded its role in the target community;
 - How you would revise the program if you were to received second year funding;
 - And how HUD should refine this funding initiative


