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

Reminders for 2023

- The Age category was expanded to align with other data collection and to give us greater insight on people experiencing homelessness.
 - The PIT Extrapolation Tool will be updated to include the updated age categories and posted to HUD Exchange
- If your CoC conducted a full count in 2022 it is not required to conduct a full count in 2023 (though we would strongly encourage you to consider doing so.



Considerations for CoCs experiencing an influx of migrants





Considerations for CoCs experiencing an influx of migrants

- People are included in the count based on their housing status on the night of the count.
- If they have no place to sleep and are either in a place not meant for human habitation or receiving emergency shelter they should be counted.
- This may require added coordination with those who are administering care if it is not being handled in your normal homeless assistance system.
- With regard to the HIC, consider how permanent these programs may be. If you believe they are temporary (as in the program is dealing with a short term crisis and will then expire in the coming months) then you should likely mark these programs as ad hoc rather than year-round.



Updates to PIT Count Methodology Questions







The Why - Background and context for updates

We ask about methodology

- We want to understand how people are conducting the count and provide support when needed
- Working on a communication kit to help talk about the PIT count, including the methodology

We are updating the methodology questions

- We want to make sure we are only asking what is relevant
- The updates remove some things that we don't think were necessary while adding clarity in a few areas that needed more explanation



Summary of Key Updates

- Removed subpopulation questions
- Simplified data source questions for sheltered population
- Updated wording of some questions for clarity; added examples to answer options
- Added more detail to questions about approaches used for counting unsheltered population
- Updated response options for change from prior count questions; select top three reasons instead of all
- Added open-ended responses to some questions to allow more specificity



Removed subpopulation questions

CoCs will no longer have to answer questions asking about sheltered and unsheltered populations.

Example of unsheltered subpopulation questions that will **no longer be asked:**

10. Were all people who were encountered during canvassing on the night of the count or during post night of the count PIT activities asked to complete a survey/interview?

- All people encountered were surveyed
- A subset of people was surveyed

10a. How did the CoC select those people?

- People were selected randomly
- People were not selected randomly, but an effort was made to select a sample of people that "represented" all unsheltered people
- People were not selected randomly, and the selection was driven by practicality or expediency (e.g., people willing and able to complete a survey on the night of the PIT count)

Simplified data source questions for sheltered population

CoCs will now answer this question *only* at the full population level (Sheltered Population rather than Subpopulation):

Updated wording of some questions for clarity; added examples to answer options


