SUPPORT Act Overview

Public Law 115-271 - SUPPORT for Patients and Communities Act October 24, 2018

- Developed in response to the opioid epidemic
- Section 8071 authorized the program to aid grantees with providing stable, temporary housing to individuals in recovery from a substance use disorder
- Eligible States and the District of Columbia had age-adjusted rates of drug overdose deaths above the national overdose mortality rate
- Based on CDBG under title 1 of Housing and Community Development Act (1974)

Recovery Housing Program Funding

- FY 2020 Budget appropriated \$25 million to RHP (25 grantees)
- FY 2021 Budget appropriated a second round of \$25 million (27 grantees)
- The allocation formula includes unemployment rates (15%), labor force nonparticipation (15%), and the age-adjusted rates of drug overdose deaths (70%)
- Program rules, waivers, alternative requirements for the first allocation published in the Federal Register in November 2020
- Round 2 funding notice is in development

RHP Overview

RHP is organized within the framework of the Community Development Block Grant, CDBG program.

The three fundamental pillars for CDBG compliance are:

1. National Objective

 Benefit Low- and Moderate- Income Persons based on the Limited Clientele criteria, as modified by the RHP Notice

2. Eligible Activity

 Use funds only for the limited list of eligible activities specified to carry out the purpose of RHP, found in the RHP Notice

3. Connection to Program Purpose

Provide stable, temporary housing for individuals in recovery from a substance use disorder

- Project review and selection
 - Financial Feasibility
 - Services Plan
- Subrecipient oversight and management, if applicable

Citizen Participation Plan

Revise to indicate public review and comment process for RHP

 Amend plan to describe process for consultation with and participation of organizations interested in residential recovery programs for persons with SUD and for review and comment on proposed RHP Action Plan before submission to HUD

Public must have opportunity to comment on proposed amendment to
 Citizen Participation Plan for a minimum of 15 days before final adoption



The RHP Action Plan must include the following:

- Proposed use of all funds
- Criteria for eligibility
- How use addresses the purpose of RHP to provide stable, temporary housing to persons in recovery from a substance use disorder

Standard Form 424 and 424D

- Program summary
 - Concise executive summary that identifies needs and specific goals for RHP funds.

- Additional anticipated resources
 - Identify other federal and state, local, nonprofit, or private resources expected to be made available in conjunction with the use of RHP funds.
 - Not limited to liquid resources. Publicly-owned real property can also be identified.
- Administration summary
 - Include roles of grantee agencies/departments in the administration of the RHP grant, provide contact information.

Use and Allocation of Funds

- Method of distribution to local governments (including CDBG Entitlement), if applicable
- Direct implementation: via grantee staff; award funding via contracts or subrecipient agreements
- Description of eligible subrecipients and threshold criteria

Use and Allocation of Funds

- Description of evaluation criteria, including how will meet the SUPPORT Act requirement that grantees give priority to:
 - Entities with the greatest need
 - Entities with the ability to deliver effective assistance in a timely manner
- Other Evaluation Criteria

Definitions

Individual in Recovery

Sample adapted from the SAMHSA definition of recovery:

An individual going through a process of change to improve their health and wellness, live a self-directed life, and strive to reach their full potential.

Four major dimensions support a life in recovery:

Health

Home

Purpose

Community

Definitions

Substance Use Disorder – cannot limit definition to specific types of SUD

Sample SAMHSA definition of substance use disorder:

Substance use disorders occur when the recurrent use of alcohol and/or drugs causes clinically significant impairment, including health problems, disability, and failure to meet responsibilities at work, school, or home.

Sample Mayo Clinic Definition of substance use disorder

Drug addiction, also called substance use disorder, is a disease that affects a person's brain and behavior and leads to an inability to control the use of a legal or illegal drug or medication. Substances such as alcohol, marijuana and nicotine also are considered drugs.

- Expenditure plan to meet deadlines and administrative cap
- Outcomes

Required outcome measures:

- Number of individuals assisted in RHP activities
- Number of individuals able to transition to permanent housing from RHP-assisted temporary housing

Proposed outcome measures:

 Grantees are encouraged to confer with researchers to better understand other potential measurable impacts



Project Selection

Develop and Execute Written Agreements with Funded Agencies

Conduct Management and Oversight of Projects

- Negotiate and execute written agreements with partner agencies
 - e.g., interagency or intergovernmental agreements, to formalize roles determined during partner coordination and stated in the Action Plan
- Ensure division of responsibilities are clearly defined
- Establish key milestones and progress expectations
- Define scope and frequency of reporting

Project Selection

- Publish NOFA, RFA, RFP or complete other selection process consistent with:
 - Administrative roles and subrecipient administration
 - Use of funds
 - Eligibility
 - Selection criteria described in Action Plan
- Include applicable federal cross-cutting requirements:
 - URA/104(d)
 - Section 3
 - Civil Rights/Fair Housing
 - Lead Based Paint
 - Environmental Review
 - Procurement
- Review and select project(s), announce funding awards

Develop and Execute Written Agreements with Funded Agencies

- Ensure environmental review completed prior to project costs incurred
- Ensure compliance with URA/104(d) ensuring all occupants of acquired property receive required notices, referrals, and assistance
- Include all applicable CDBG, RHP and cross-cutting requirements in written agreement

Conduct Management and Oversight of Projects

 Conduct management and oversight of projects consistent with roles/responsibilities and oversight of subrecipients and contractors (as applicable) described in Action Plan

Track funding disbursements to ensure compliance with statutory timelines:

- 30% within 1 year of funding
- 100% by 9/1/2027 (for FY 20 funds)



Sample Program Design

Sample Program Implementation #1



The state RHP grantee has decided to act directly and partner with the SSA to evaluate applications and provide recovery support services funding. The NOFA process results in an award to a private nonprofit subrecipient for acquisition and minor rehabilitation of an occupied residential rental property (a 4bedroom home) built in 1950 to operate as recovery housing. The target population is individuals with SUD transitioning from or at risk of homelessness.



- Ongoing Monitoring
