





Evolution of Section 3



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Section 3 is codified in the Housing and Urban Development Act

1995 FHEO published the current regulations in 24 CFR Part 135



2015 FHEO published new proposed regulations in 24 CFR Part 135, which never became final

2019 FPM published proposed regulations in 24 CFR Part 75 **2021** Compliance on the new regulations in 24 CFR Part 75 begins April 3, 2019 Published proposed rule

June 3, 2019 Comment period closed

September 2019 Completed review of comments and finalize rule

December 2019 Internal clearance

March-August 2020 OMB review

September 29, 2020 Published final rule

November 30, 2020 Effective Date

July 1, 2021 Compliance on new regulation begins



Final Rule seeks to improve effectiveness in several ways...

PROMOTES SUSTAINED EMPLOYMENT AND CAREER DEVELOPMENT

FOCUSES REPORTING ON KEY OUTCOME METRICS

ALIGNS REPORTING WITH STANDARD BUSINESS PRACTICES

PROVIDES PROGRAM SPECIFIC OVERSIGHT **CLARIFIES OBLIGATIONS**







Final Rule Timeline

Legacy Projects **Legacy Projects:** Contracts executed or projects for which assistance or funds were committed prior to November 30, 2020

Requirement:

- Adhere to the old rule (24 CFR Part 135)
- Expected to maintain records but will no longer be required to report Section 3 compliance to HUD in SPEARS.



Final Rule Timeline

Transition Period **Transition Period:** Projects for which assistance or funds are committed between November 30, 2020 and July 1, 2021

Requirement:

- Adhere to the final rule (24 CFR Part 75)
- Expected to maintain records but will no longer be required to report Section 3 compliance to HUD in SPEARS.

Additional Clarification (CPD Notice 21-09)

 OBGA-Funded Projects: Report in IDIS or DRGR for open activities starting July 1, 2021.

Key Changes to the Section 3 Rule: A Summary Chart

Defining a Section 3 Project

Site or sites together with any building(s) and improvements located on the site(s) that are under common ownership, management, and financing.

Section 3 applies...

UNDERSTAND THE BASICS

- applies to an entire Section 3 project, regardless of whether the project is fully or partially assisted under HUD programs that provide housing and community development financial assistance.
- applies to all public housing financial assistance funds, regardless of the amount of assistance from HUD.





Defining a Section 3 worker

A Section 3 Worker is any worker who **currently fits**, or **when hired within the past five years** fit, at least one of the following categories, as documented:



• A low or very low-income worker

OR



Employed by a Section 3 business concern

OR



A Youthbuild participant





Targeted Section 3 Worker





Targeted Section 3 Worker is:



• Employed by a Section 3 business concern

OR



- Currently fits or when hired fit at least one of the following categories as documented within the past five years:
 - A resident of public housing or Section 8-assisted housing
 - A resident of other public housing projects or Section 8-assisted housing managed by the PHA that is providing the assistance
 - A YouthBuild participant





Targeted Section 3 Worker





Targeted Section 3 Worker is:



• Employed by a Section 3 business concern

OR



- Currently fits or when hired fit at least one of the following categories as documented within the past five years:
 - Living within the service area or the neighborhood of the project, as defined in 24 CFR 75.5
 - A YouthBuild participant





PROGRAM OVERSIGHT


Service Area as Defined in 24 CFR 75.5

A. *Service Area* = an area within one mile of the Section 3 project

OR

B. If < 5,000 people live within one mile of Section 3 project,

Then, Service Area = an area within a circle centered around the Section 3 project site that encompasses 5,000 people.







Targeted Section 3 Worker - Comparison



PH Assistance

 Employed by a Section 3 business concern

Or

- Currently fits or when hired fit at least one of the following categories as documented within the past five years:
 - A resident of public housing
 - A resident of other public housing projects or Section 8-assisted housing

 Employed by a Section 3 business concern

Or

- Currently fits or when hired fit at least one of the following categories as documented within the past five years:
 - Living within the service area or the neighborhood of the project, as defined in 24 CFR 75.5
 - A YouthBuild participant

Multiple Sources of Housing and Community Development

- PHA must follow subpart B of Part 75
- HCD may follow subpart B or C of Part 75



• Must follow subpart C of Part 75



TIP: For Section 3 projects that include public housing financial assistance and housing and community development financial assistance, recipients may want to consider following subpart B for consistency in reporting.





Redefining Section 3 Business Concerns

A Section 3 business is:



 51% or more owned and controlled by low or very-low income persons

OR



• Over 75% of the labor hours performed for the business over the prior three-month period are performed by Section 3 workers

OR



 51% or more owned and controlled by current residents of public housing or Section 8-assisted housing



Knowledge Check



What are the Low-Income & Very Low-Income Limits?

 Defined at Section 3(b)(2) of the Housing Act of 1937

- Determined annually by HUD
- Section 8 income limits are used to determine eligibility
- Limits are typically established at 80 percent and 50 percent of the area median *individual* income

What is YouthBuild?

Academic and occupational skills training program serving youth ages 16 – 24 who have dropped-out of high school, or previously dropped-out and re-enrolled.

Additional Criteria:

- A member of a low-income family and/or
- A youth in foster care (including youth aging out of foster care) and/or
- A youth or adult offender and/or
- A youth with a disability and/or
- The child of an incarcerated parent and/or
- A migrant youth.

PH

Public Housing Financial Assistance



- Development Assistance
- Operating Funds
- Capital Funds
- All mixed-finance development
- Programs incorporated through NOFO/NOFA processes: RAD, Jobs Plus, FSS, ROSS, Choice Neighborhood and other similar programs.

Threshold

No thresholds: all public housing financial assistance is covered, regardless of the amount of expenditure or size of contract.



Applicability

- Housing Rehab
- Housing Construction
- Other public construction

Threshold is met if the total amount of HCD assistance exceeds \$200,000

Threshold









Lead Threshold

UNDERSTAND THE BASICS



 Threshold is met if amount of Office of Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Homes assistance exceeds \$100,000.





Section 3 does not apply to...

- Material Supply Contracts
- Indian and Tribal Preferences



Tip: For other HUD or federal assistance that is not subject to Section 3, recipients are encouraged to consider ways to support the purpose of Section 3.

)- Important Detail on RAD:

- Often entails capital improvements: this one-time activity is covered by Section 3.
- Properties converted through the RAD program are covered by the same rules applicable to Section 8, however, the RAD governing notice does apply Section 3 requirements to those activities occurring after the date of the RAD conversion which are contractually obligated as part of the RAD conversion.

What is Safe Harbor?

A safe harbor is a provision of a statute or a regulation that specifies that certain conduct will be deemed not to violate a given rule.

Safe Harbor Compliance Check

Complied with safe harbor if:

Met or exceeded the Section 3 benchmarks AND Followed the required prioritization of effort



Absent evidence of the contrary

Safe Harbor Compliance Check



What if a recipient can't meet the quantitative benchmarks + prioritization of effort?



Provide evidence that they have made **<u>qualitative</u>** efforts to assist low and very low-income persons with employment and training opportunities.

What is a Labor Hour?



Hours worked by all workers employed with public housing financial assistance in a PHA *fiscal year*



Hours worked by all workers employed on a Section 3 Project





Benchmarks



- 25% or more of all labor hours worked by all workers employed with public housing financial assistance in the PHA's or other recipient's <u>fiscal year</u> must be Section 3 workers.
- 5% or more of all labor hours worked by all workers employed with public housing financial assistance in the PHA's or other recipient's <u>fiscal year</u> must be Targeted Section 3 workers.

AND





Section 3 labor hours	= 25%
Total labor hours	2070

 $\frac{\text{Targeted Section 3 labor hours}}{\text{Total labor hours}} = 5\%$





Benchmarks



• 25% or more of all labor hours must be worked by Section 3 Workers

AND

• 5% or more of all labor hours must be worked by Targeted Section 3 Workers:





 $\frac{\text{Section 3 labor hours}}{\text{Total labor hours}} = 25\%$

 $\frac{\text{Targeted Section 3 labor hours}}{\text{Total labor hours}} = 5\%$





Professional Service Labor Hour

What is it?

Non-construction services that require an advanced degree or professional licensing are <u>excluded</u> from Section 3 Final Rule.




Bonus Opportunity:


- Recipient may count any work performed by a professional services Section 3 worker or Targeted Section 3 worker as Section 3 labor hours and as Targeted Section 3 labor hours by adding to the numerator.
- Do not count the professional services as part of the total labor hours (i.e., in the denominator of the calculation).



Updates to Safe Harbor Provisions & Benchmarks


- HUD will update the benchmarks through a document published in the FEDERAL REGISTER
- The benchmarks will be subject to public comment
- Not less than once every 3 years




