

## Chart: Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) Covered Housing

The Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) is a Federal law that, in part, provides housing protections for people applying for or living in units subsidized by the federal government and who have experienced domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking ("VAWA violence/abuse"), to help keep them safe and reduce their likelihood of experiencing homelessness.

VAWA housing protections are listed at <u>34 U.S.C. 12491, et seq</u> and may be divided into two categories:

- The Right to Report is the right for anyone to seek law enforcement or emergency assistance without being penalized (for example, by their landlord or local law enforcement). This right applies to all people, regardless of whether they are or have been a survivor of VAWA violence/abuse or live in federally subsidized housing. In addition, people cannot be penalized due to criminal activity if they were the victim or were not at fault. - 2. Housing Protections in Federally Subsidized Units are rights that VAWA provides to survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking who are *applying for or living in shelter or rental housing units subsidized by the Federal government*. For a full list of these rights, please refer to the FAQ at www.hud.gov/vawa. These rights include but are not limited to:
  - Protection from adverse rental decisions (such as denial of admission or assistance and eviction or termination) due to experiencing VAWA violence/abuse.
  - Having the option to stay in the unit, even if there has been criminal activity directly related to VAWA violence/abuse.
  - Right to request an emergency transfer to move into a new, safe unit due to VAWA violence/abuse.
  - Protection from retaliation by the housing provider, including both landlords and service providers, for seeking or exercising VAWA protections.

The following chart shows the housing programs covered by **VAWA's housing protections**. Please note that HUD and other agencies may identify additional covered programs in the future.
