- Provided \$1.5 billion under the Homelessness Prevention Fund for homeless prevention and rapid re-housing activities
- Established as Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-housing Program (HPRP)
- Notice published 3/19/09

- Focus of HPRP is housing stabilization
- Provides temporary financial assistance and/or services to help persons gain housing stability
- Temporary assistance as a bridge to long term stability

Program Intent

- Intent is to serve persons who:
 - Are homeless or would be homeless <u>but</u>
 <u>for</u> this assistance
 - Can remain stably housed <u>after</u> this temporary assistance ends

- A mortgage assistance program
- Intended to serve persons who need long-term and/or intensive supports
- ESG Program
 - Different eligibility requirements & activities
- Rapid Re-housing (RRH) Demonstration
 - Different requirements and activities

Key Differences between HPRP & RRH Demonstration

Item	RRH Demo	HPRP
Eligibility	Families with children	Individuals or Families (with or without children)
Rental Assistance Period	3-6 months OR 12-15 months	Any # of months up to 18 months
Centralizeu Intake Process	Required	Recommended

Eligible Applicants

- Funds allocated by ESG formula, with grant minimum set by HUD at \$500,000
- Total of 540 grantees
- Grantees are strongly encouraged to consider their capacity to use all of the allocation
- Applicants can request less than the full amount allocated and/or decline to submit an application

- Eligible applicants are states, metropolitan cities, urban counties, and territories who can subgrant to local units of government and/or private nonprofit organizations
- No required match

Other Requirements

- HPRP funds must be issued to a third party (e.g., landlord or utility company),
 NOT directly to program participants
- An assisted property may not be owned by the grantee, subgrantee or the parent, subsidiary or affiliated organization of the subgrantee
- Funds used for ineligible activities must be repaid to HUD

- May 18, 2009: Substantial Amendments due
- Within 45 days of receipt: HUD completes review
 - Once grant agreements are signed by HUD this starts the clock for expenditure deadlines
- Sept 30: Grant Agreements with sub-grantees must be signed
- Two years from date HUD signed grant agreement:
 - 60% funds expended
- Three years: 100% expended

Eligible Participants

- Program participants must be homeless or about to become homeless AND:
 - Initial consultation to determine appropriate assistance
 - Income of 50% or less Area Median Income
 (AMI): see www.huduser.org/DATASETS/il.html
 - No other housing options
 - No financial resources or support networks to obtain or remain in housing

Eligible Activities – Four Categories

- Financial Assistance
 - Short and medium term rental assistance, security/utility deposits, utility payments, moving assistance, motel/hotel vouchers
- Housing Relocation & Stabilization Serv.
 - Outreach/engagement, case management, legal services, housing search/placement, credit repair

Eligible Activities – Four Categories

Data Collection and Evaluation

- Costs related to data collection on HPRP clients in HMIS or comparable database, as appropriate
- Costs associated with participating in HUD's evaluation of HPRP

Administrative costs

 Costs related to accounting of funds, audit, preparation of HUD reports, grant administration, staff training on HPRP

- HPRP equals HUD's entire annual homeless assistance budget
- Infusion of targeted and essential resources
- Provides new opportunities to Continuums of Care (CoCs)



Prevention

- Re-orients homeless planning efforts
- Housing stability-oriented approach
- Change the way communities solve homelessness



- Encourage grantees to think outside the box in program implementation
- Adopt key components of best practice models with jurisdictional variation
- Maximize use of other ARRA funds and existing mainstream resources

- Form partnerships
- Prioritize people most likely to become homeless
 - Analyze HMIS/other data for predictors
- Continuous performance improvement
 - Reviewing shelter admission data to see who was served but still became homeless and who was not served and became homeless

 - Rental Counseling to Prevent Homelessness Program
- Hennepin County, MN
 - Prevention Program

Community Example: Prevention Lancaster County, PA

Services:

- Housing counseling
- Budget counseling
- Landlord mediation/advocacy
- Protective payee servicesCommunity building

Services:

- Legal services to address eviction cases in court
- Short and long-term case management
- Volunteer assistance to help families stabilize housing
- Landlord/tenant mediation and assistance in securing new housing if housing is lost
- Financial assistance

- Source of funding:
 - TANF block grant
 - State general revenue funds
- Outcomes:
 - Over 95% of families remained housed in succeeding 12 months
 - Over two-year period a cost of \$938,898 was used for prevention, \$331 per family

Key Rapid Re-Housing Provisions

- Quickly assess people's immediate barriers to housing
- Partner with community organizations to locate housing

Community Examples: Rapid Re-housing

- Boston, MA
 - Rapid Re-housing Program
- Columbus, OH
 - Rapid Re-housing for Families Program

Community Example: Rapid Re-housing Boston, MA

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Boston, MA HomeStart:

- Housing search
- Home visits
- Case management
- Budgeting assistance
- Tenancy counseling
- Emergency rental funds
- Housing vouchers

Community Example: Rapid Re-housing Boston, MA

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HomeStart Funding

- Budget \$5 million annually
- 80-85% McKinney-Vento grants
- Contracts with state agencies

Outcomes:

- Since 1994 over 3,500 people moved to permanent housing
- 90% of people are still housed one year later

Community Example: Rapid Re-housing Columbus, OH 30 Key initiatives:

- Developed short-term rental subsidies
- Single point of entry to homeless system
- Rapid Re-housing
- Data and Planning

Outcomes:

- Families served by the emergency shelter system have declined dramatically
 - 1995: 1,168 familiesFY 2008: 786
- Successful housing outcomes have risen steadily
 - 27% in 1995
 - 67% in FY 2008

- HPRP is a one-time influx of funds to implement and learn from innovative approaches
- Grantees must be administered in coordination with the Continuum and other local efforts
- Grantees are required to coordinate HPRP funds with other ARRA funds in the community

Thinking Ahead – What are you trying to achieve with HPRP?

- Outcomes of HPRP can include:
 - Reducing the length of stay in shelter or in homelessness
 - Reducing the number of people experiencing homelessness for the first time
 - Increasing the number of people who are diverted from shelter to stable housing
 - Reducing repeat episodes of homelessness
 - Reducing the number of people overall who are homeless
